CONFERENCE OVERVIEW

The Prime Power Diesel Inter-Utility Conference (PPDIUC) brings together utility and industry professionals, as well as energy leaders to explore the evolving role of prime power diesel generation and alternative renewable energy solutions in off-grid utility operations across North America.

With the growing shift toward cleaner energy sources, diesel generation remains a critical pillar for reliable electricity in remote communities, off-grid locations, emergency response scenarios, and as backup for essential infrastructure. This conference provides a focused forum for North American off-grid Utilities to share technical best practices, strategies and innovations that ensure diesel and alternative energy systems remain efficient, compliant, and resilient.

THE LOGO

Vector format simplification:



The visual identity for PPDIUC 2026 was developed by Qulliq Energy Corporation's Communications Team, with the preliminary illustrations created by **Catherine Gissing**, a talented summer student who joined the team in 2025.

The logo reflects the evolution of energy in the North, beginning with the qulliq, the traditional Inuit oil lamp that provided light, warmth, and survival, transitioning into modern power line posts that represent today's electricity systems. This progression symbolizes the continuity of energy as a source of life and connection, carrying traditional knowledge forward into the future through innovation and new technology.

1. The Inukshuk: Represents Nunavut and its people. Traditionally, inuksuit are markers of guidance and community. In this design, the inukshuk is slightly facing to the right, symbolizing a forward-looking perspective toward the future. This orientation reflects progress, growth, and the journey toward modern energy solutions while honoring the strength of Inuit traditions. It stands as a symbol of resilience and unity.

2. The Qulliq: The traditional Inuit oil lamp, is featured to honor the origins of 'power' in Nunavut. Resting on an antler, it symbolizes a deep connection to the land, wildlife, and traditional Inuit practices. For generations, the qulliq provided warmth, light, and a sense of home. Together, the qulliq and antler remind us that energy has always been a lifeline in the Arctic, rooted in respect and it continues to connect us through nature, culture and history.

3. The Powerlines : On the opposite side, we have modern powerlines, which represent today's energy systems. This reflects how we've evolved from traditional methods of energy to modern infrastructure and emerging renewable technologies. Together, the qulliq and powerlines create a visual narrative of our transition the past, present, and future.

4. The Landscape: Reflects the natural beauty of the North, serving as a reminder of why we're here: to find reliable, sustainable energy solutions that respect and preserve the land we call home.




Step onto the frozen sea and experience a tradition that has sustained Inuit families for generations.

What to wear


These items will help you stay comfortable and prepared for the winter conditions in Iqaluit during April / May:

VISION


